Michael S. Barr is Professor of Law at the University of Michigan Law School, where he teaches Financial Institutions and International Finance. Barr is a Senior Fellow at the Center for American Progress and a nonresident Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution. Barr conducts large-scale empirical research regarding low- and moderate-income households. Barr recently co-edited *Building Inclusive Financial Systems* (Brookings Press 2007, with Kumar & Litan) and *Insufficient Funds* (Russell Sage, forthcoming, with Blank). Other recent publications include *An Inclusive Progressive National Savings and Financial Services Policy*, *Credit Where it Counts*, *Banking the Poor*, *Microfinance and Financial Development*, and *Global Administrative Law: The View from Basel*. Barr previously served as Treasury Secretary Robert E. Rubin's Special Assistant, as Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for Community Development Policy, as Special Advisor to President William J. Clinton, and as a law clerk to U.S. Supreme Court Justice David H. Souter and District Court Judge Pierre N. Leval. He received his J.D. from Yale Law School, an M. Phil in International Relations from Magdalen College, Oxford University, as a Rhodes Scholar, and his B.A., summa cum laude, with Honors in History, from Yale University.
